<p><b><u>New regulations for Sea Shipments - established on the official gazette, rule 2.4.5. for shipments arriving into Mexican ports:</u></b></p> <p>All shipments to or from overseas countries must indicate:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The TAX ID number for all parties shown on Carrier Bill of Lading as Shipper, Consignee and Notify.</li> <li>2. Mexican Nationals must inform their RFC (Tax ID) number</li> <li>3. Generic RFC/TAX ID numbers should be applied only in the following cases:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Diplomatic and consulate goods should use: EMB930401KH4.</li> <li>▪ For International Organizations should use: OIN930413N0.</li> <li>▪ For foreigners should use: EXTR920301TS4</li> </ul> </li> <li>4. For those shippers or consignees or notify parties which resides in countries where there are NO ID TAX (Fiscal identification register) such information will not be declared.</li> <li>5. TAX ID information MUST be submitted no less than 24 hours prior to the vessel departure, failure to provide such information may result in refusal to load on to vessel.</li> </ol>			
<p><b>Removal goods</b></p>	<p><b>Returning Mexicans:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Original or notarised copy of Mexican passport.</li> <li>• Original legalized inventory (without values) in Spanish, stamped by the Mexican Consulate in the country of origin.</li> <li>• Declaratory Letter addressed to the correspondent Customs Warehouse, in which customer has to declare that his belongings are new or not. Any new items have to be listed and the corresponding proof of purchase (invoice) attached in order for the customer to pay the corresponding</li> </ul>	<p><b>USEFUL INFORMATION</b></p> <p>According to the Mexican laws, in order to be able to import household goods and personal effects free of import duties, the following rules must be followed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The goods must have been used for at least six months and are not intended for resale.</li> <li>• All articles must be included in the inventory visaed by the Mexican Consulate. The Mexican government can expropriate any article not included in the inventory.</li> </ul>	<p>The Mexican citizen must have lived out of the country for at least two years to import their Household goods free of duty.</p> <p><b>Important notes:</b>          Mexican Line requires a deposit of US\$ 1,000 when the shipment is coming into a container.          For shipments entering through Mexico City Airport or through any port of entry, a Solidarity Letter will be required. Original or notarised copy is not necessary when shipper has an FM-2 or FM-3 Visa and wants to import the goods after a period of six months.</p>

Some of them may require an import licence. Contact your agent for specific information.</li> </ul> <p>Shipments consigned to Mexico City terminal are handled by steamship line companies own transportation system. Please contact your agent for them to take care of transportation to avoid unnecessary demurrage charges.</p>	<p>As the Mexican ports, &amp; Customs houses are saturated, the lift-vans and steel containers are placed in the open and must therefore be well protected against rain. Do not ship household goods until all documentation is completed (the airport holds the shipment during 30 days and ports during 60 days only). If the documentation is not presented by that time, the Mexican Government confiscates the shipment. Inform your destination agent on time of the arrival of the shipment at the Customs House of port of entry in order for him to proceed with the import negotiations. Due to legal regulation the agent does not accept C.O.D. charges. (Only destination charges can come in a C.O.D. basis). All shipments must come prepaid.</p>

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<b>Diplomats' removals</b>	<p><b>Foreigners with Diplomatic status:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The import permit, “the Diplomatic Franchise” has to be obtained by the corresponding Embassy in Mexico City from the general Customs authorities.</li> <li>• Inventory list in Spanish, with an estimated value.</li> <li>• Photocopy of passport.</li> <li>• Origin and destination addresses.</li> </ul> <p><b>Mexicans returning with Diplomatic status:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The corresponding official government office to which the diplomat belongs has to get from the General Customs Authority in Mexico City the import permit know as “Diplomatic Franchise”.</li> <li>• Inventory list in Spanish, with an estimated value.</li> <li>• Photocopy of passport.</li> <li>• Origin and destination addresses.</li> </ul>		
<b>Wedding trousseaux</b>	If included as part of household goods and effects and declared in the legalised list.	Allowed – see “Removal goods”. Otherwise – importation prohibited.	Must be used. For specific cases, it is recommended to contact your local agent.
<b>Inheritance</b>	Permission is obtained from the Secretary of Commerce and Industrial Promotion (Secretaria de Comercio y Fomento Industrial) in the Federal District of Mexico (D.F.).	Otherwise prohibited.	Subject to tax payment. For specific cases, it is recommended to contact your local agent.
<b>New furniture and household goods</b>	If included with removal goods, they must be included on the legalised inventory list and originals of all invoices must also be presented.	Subject to payment of duties and taxes. Maximum 1000 US\$.	Only possible for shipments through NVO, Laredo, and Tamps, NOT Vera Cruz neither Mexico City Airport.


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<b>Household appliances</b>	If included as part of household goods, declared in the legalised list and in reasonable quantity.	Importation allowed - see "Removal goods". Otherwise – importation prohibited.	
<b>Electrical appliances</b>	Same as above.	Same as above.	Brand, model and serial numbers of electrical appliances must be written on the legalised inventory list, sealed by the Mexican Consulate.
<b>Works of Art, Antiques</b>	If included as part of household goods, declared in the legalised list and in reasonable quantity.	Importation allowed - see "Removal goods". Otherwise – importation prohibited.	
<b>Precious metal objects</b>		Importation prohibited, as they are not considered as part of the household effects.	
<b>Carpets</b>	If they are part of household goods and only in small quantity.	Importation allowed - see "Removal goods". Otherwise – importation prohibited.	
<b>Presents, souvenirs</b>	If part of household goods and are declared on the legalised list.	Same as above.	Subject to tax payment.
<b>Motor vehicles temporarily imported</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Original FM-3.</li> <li>• Invoice of title property.</li> <li>• License of the car.</li> <li>• Driver's license.</li> <li>• International credit card.</li> <li>• Client's personal identification.</li> <li>• Letter of authorisation given to the agent, authorising him to take care of the transportation of the car from Monterrey to its final destination.</li> </ul>	Duty of US\$ 50 is payable by international credit card.	<p>Shippers must be at port of entry to clear Customs and obtain the temporary import permit. 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<b>Machines, appliances, spare parts</b>		Importation prohibited, as they are not considered as part of the household effects.	
<b>Wine, alcohol</b>		Importation prohibited.	If wines and liquors are found in the household goods, the clearance may be delayed and extra handling must be paid to take wines/liquors out and keep them in Customs Dominion until the customer gets the corresponding import permit and pays the duties/taxes.
<b>Tin and food</b>		Same as above.	
<b>Arms, ammunition and explosives</b>		Importation prohibited, as they are not considered as part of the household effects.	
<b>Medicines, drugs and narcotics</b>	If medicines are included as part of the household goods and only if prescribed by a doctor.	Importation prohibited.	
<b>Plants</b>		Same as above.	
<b>Cats and dogs, other animals</b>	If value exceeds US\$ 5000 (national currency): <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Authorisation from the Secretary of Commerce and Industrial Promotion.</li> <li>• Sanitary B/L.</li> <li>• General certificate of Health.</li> <li>• Vaccination certificate if value under US\$ 5000 (national currency).</li> <li>• The same documentation is needed excepting the authorisation from the Secretary of Commerce and Industrial Promotion.</li> </ul>	Subject to payment of duties.	It is recommended to send documents and AWB in advance by fax, to avoid delays in releasing pets. It is also recommended to arrange for arrival at the beginning of the week, to avoid pets being kept in Customs control over a weekend, when there is no one to feed them.

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<p>Fumigation of imported and exported wooden crates</p>		<p>The Mexican Government will adopt ISPM-15 (International standards for Phytosanitary Measures Publication 15: Guidelines for Regulating Wood Packaging Material in International Trade (aka NIFM-15) to standardise the treatment of wood packing materials used for the transport of goods.</p> <p>Effective September 16, 2005, shipments into or out of Mexico in wooden packaging, will have to have a Seal, which certifies that the shipment has received the required treatment (HT = Heated Treatment [a minimum wood core temperature of 56°C for a minimum of 30 minutes] or Methyl Bromide Treatment (the minimum temperature should not be less than 10°C and the minimum exposure time should not fall below 16 hours).</p> <p>The wood packing material must be marked in a visible location on each article, on at least two opposite sides of the article with a legible and permanent mark in black ink. Labels and adhesives are not allowed.
