Fumigation of wood packaging		The Chilean Government adopted ISPM-15 (International standards for Phytosanitary Measures Publication 15) Guidelines for Regulating Wood Packaging Material in International Trade (aka NIFM-15) to standardise the treatment of wood packing materials used for the transport of goods. Shipments into or out of the country in wooden packaging, need to have a Seal, certifying that the shipment has received the required treatment (HT = Heated Treatment [a minimum wood core temperature of 56°C for a minimum of 30 minutes] or fumigation with Methyl Bromide (MT). The minimum temperature should not be less than 10°C and the minimum exposure time should not fall below 16 hours. The treatments established in the present regulation have the intent to reduce the introduction and/or the dissemination of quarantine plagues associated to the wood packing.	This regulation DOES NOT apply to wood packing materials manufactured of: Raw wood of 6 mm thickness or less Processed wood produced by glue, heat and pressure, or a combination thereof Plywood sheets & agglomerated sawdust sheet Oriented wooden fibre sheets Sawdust & Wooden fibre



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		The wood packing material must be marked in a visible location on each article, on at least two opposite sides of the article with a legible and permanent mark in black ink. Labels and adhesives are not allowed. The approved format of the mark should be as follows:

		Where XX is the country code, 000 the producer number, YY the treatment type, and AAA the inspection agency logo.	
		If a shipment arrives without this seal, it will be returned to the origin country at the shipper's/origin Agent's expenses.
